CSCD Overview

The Wichita County Community Supervision and Corrections Department (CSCD) employs 23 staff members and supervises approximately 1,875 probationers at any one time. The department has specialized caseloads for sex offenders, individuals with substance abuse problems and individuals with mental health needs. Additionally, in September 2021, the department created a bond supervision unit that is completely funded by Wichita County. The CSCD serves three District Courts, the 30th, 78th and 89th and serves two County Court-at-law courts.



Wichita County has a population of approximately 132,000 residents and includes the cities of Wichita Falls, Burkburnett, Iowa Park, Electra and several rural communities.





Current Programs & Services for FY2024-2025

4- The Sex Offender Program consists of probationers who have been sentenced for sex related offense, have prior sex related criminal history, or have exhibited sexually deviant behavior in their offense. The

Program provides intense supervision by performing polygraphs and maintaining frequent contact through office visits and field visits. The probationers are referred to a Licensed Sex Offender Treatment Provider that maintains collateral contact with the CSO.

5- The Substance Abuse Programs consists of probationers who have been sentenced to SAFPF or Repeat DWI Offenders program. The programs provide intense supervision by maintaining frequent contact through office visits and field visits. The probationers are referred to local Substance Abuse outpatient programs that maintains contact with the CSO.

6-The Pre-Trial Diversion Program consists of persons who enter into agreement with the District Attorney. This program consists of low level supervision and helps provide an alternative to a Deferred/Adjudicated Supervision.

10-The Mental Health Initiative Program consists of probationers that have severe or continued mental illness/impairments. The program provides intense supervision by requiring the probationer to actively receive services from local mental health providers.

16-The Cognitive Education Skills Program consists of all probationers that have been ordered to complete a cognitive based class. The program, Courage to Change, provides behavioral lessons through seven different classes: Responsible Thinking, Self-Control, Peers, Substance Abuse, Family Ties, Social Values and Skills for a Successful Living.


19- The Alcohol and Drug Related Program consist of probationers who have been sentenced for alcohol or drug related offenses. The program provides supervision through office visits, field visits, and frequent drug tests. The probationers are referred to local Substance Abuse outpatient programs that maintains contact with the CSO.

21-The Treatment Alternative to Incarceration Program was discontinued.


22 – The Global Positioning System Program helps ensure a defendant's compliance with specific courtordered conditions such as curfew, residential and work locations and no contact order.


23 -The Pre-Trial Bond Program consist of persons who are pending sentencing and are out of jail with bond conditions. The program offers supervision as ordered by the Court and can consist of GPS monitoring.

Program Success Rates




• Sex Offender: 39 probationers served. 30 probationers continue in programming. Probationers are not considered successful until completion of the program. 39 probationers were served, including one absconder, three revocations, three progressive sanctions and two moved out of county.







Probation Population
